

## CAMBRIDGE PHILOLOGICAL SOCIETY

The Cambridge Philological Society was founded in 1872. Its objects are the furtherance of classical studies in general, and in particular the discussion and publication of critical researches into the languages, literature and civilization of Greece and Rome. Any person interested in the ancient world is eligible for membership, and any library is eligible to become an institutional subscriber.

The Society meets to hear papers around eight times per year. In addition it publishes the annual *Cambridge Classical Journal* (formerly *Proceedings of the Cambridge Philological Society*), and occasional *CCJ* Supplements. The journal publishes articles covering all aspects of the Classical world and its reception: the editors welcome unsolicited submissions from all areas of Classical scholarship. Contributions should be addressed to Dr Caroline Vout, Christ's College, Cambridge CB2 3BU (ccjeditors@classics.cam.ac.uk). The Supplements are an occasional series of monographs designed to accommodate works of intermediate size (up to 80,000 words). Proposals should be discussed with the Supplements editor, Dr Christopher Whitton, Emmanuel College, Cambridge CB2 3AP (clw36@cam.ac.uk).

**In 2012 *CCJ* will become part of Cambridge Journals Online, making the journal available in electronic form as well as continuing to be produced in hard copy. All back numbers (from 1882) will be digitised in early 2012 to create an online archive accessible to members and available for purchase by libraries and institutions.**

### SUPPLEMENTS AND BACK NUMBERS

Two Supplements have been published in recent months: *Unclassical Traditions II: perspectives from east and west in late antiquity* (ed. Kelly, Flower and Williams) and *Ratio et res ipsa: Classical essays presented by former pupils to James Diggle on his retirement* (ed. Millett, Oakley and Thompson). ### SUBSCRIPTIONS

From 2012 all individual members may choose between two subscription levels.
