SECUNDUS = RED

TERTIUS = YELLOW

QUARTUS = LIGHT BROWN

QUINTUS = BLACK

SEXTUS = PURPLE

SEPTIMUS = LIGHT BLUE

OCTAVUS = DARK BROWN

NONUS = GREEN

DECIMUS = WHITE





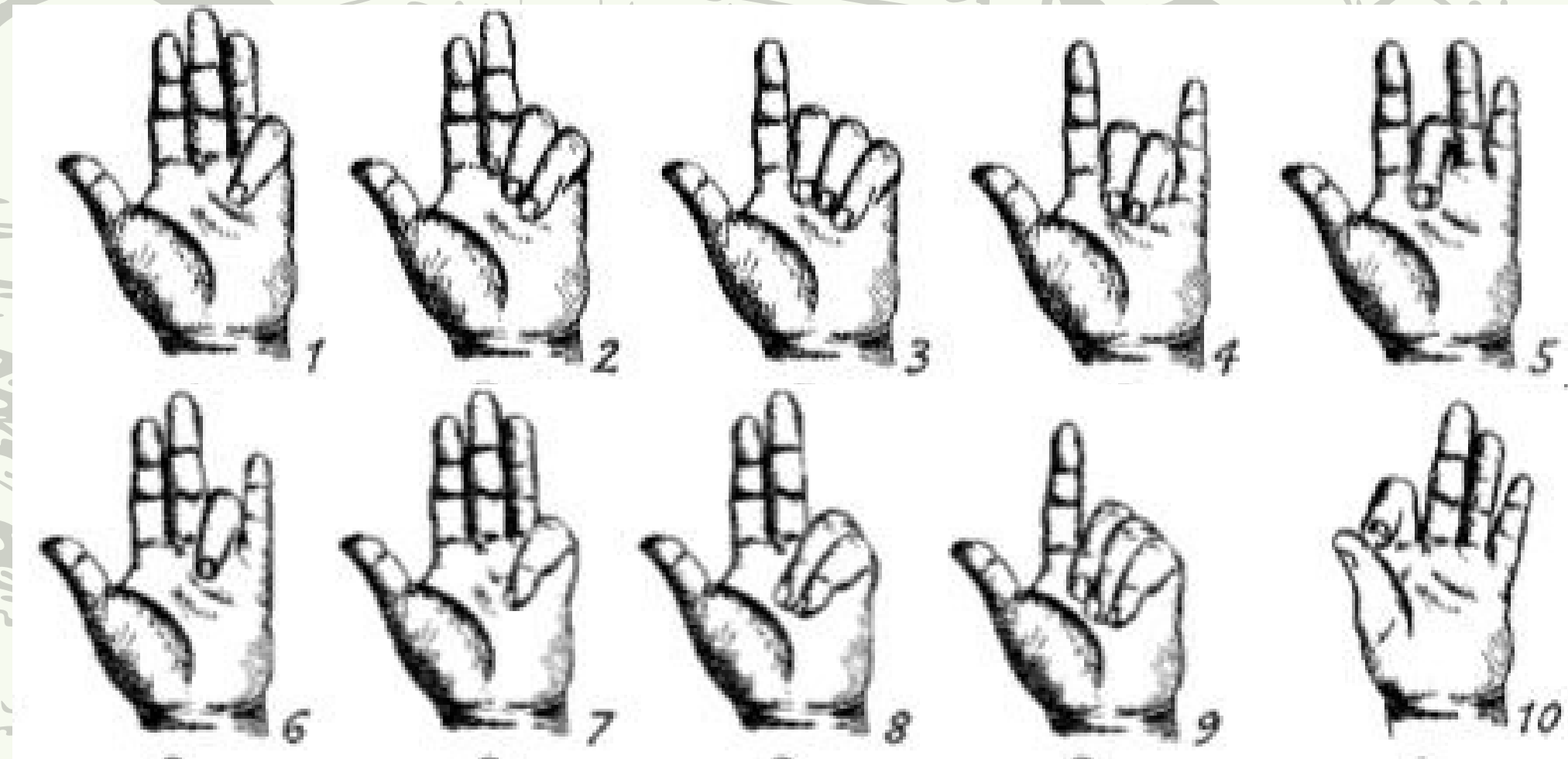
